GENERAL MINING NOTES.

A 100-stamp mill is talked of in the Atlanta mine of Idaho.

Anthracite coal has been found within three miles of Boise City, Idaho.

The Green Mountain mine, in Plumas county, has a large area of ground, two mills, one of 20 and one of 12 stamps, and is paying dividends.

The bullion shipment from San Bernardino for the year 1879, through Wells, Fargo & Co., amount to \$164,851, and the amount of gold dust was \$1,300.

The Highland Chief combination at Leadville has struck mineral, running \$10,000 per ton, and a sharp advance has taken place in the stock of the combination.

Professor Sillemann describes a new mineral compound found in the Vulturne mine, Arizona, as an insoluble sulphate of iron and potash containing gold, a species not described by Dana.

The Sierra county mail has been transported from Sierra City via of Moore's Flat, men and boys on snow shoes acting as carriers for several days.

Last week bullion to the amount of 219,795 pounds was shipped by the Eureka Com., a daily average of 21,399 pounds, the product of two furnaces.

The Carson Tribune says the richest gold-bearing rock ever found in that State was found a few days since a little west of the old burying ground a little south of the King's canyon road.

The Lady Bryan mine has been assessed 50 cents a share, delinquent January 30. The stock sold recently for five cents. Few will give fifty cents for the sake of retaining something worth only five cents.

The second dividend of the Chrysolite Mining Company has been declared, amounting to \$200,000. This, and also the first dividend of the same amount, are applied to the payment of the property.

A Strange Case.

S. F. Stock Report.

One of the strangest cases of disguised sex ever recorded is reported at Watsonville. Charley Parkhurst, one of the expert stage drivers of the coast since the early days, died at his ranch six miles from that place, aged 67 years, and when he came to be laid out for encoffining it was discovered that Charley Parkhurst was a woman—a fully formed and developed woman. For thirty years this woman, under the name of Charley Parkhurst, has passed as a man, leading the rugged life incidental to early times, associating only with men, and following the rougher and more robust occupations of a man's life in interior California, without her sex even being suspected. As a stage driver she was famous, being a first class whip, and ranking with the celebrated stage drivers of the coast. Retiring from stage driving several years ago, she followed farming and wood chopping at which latter she was expert, and at the time of her death had accumulated several thousand dollars. She was registered as a voter in 1867 under the name of Charles Durkee Parkhurst, aged 55, a native of New Hampshire, residence, Sequel. This may explain the mystery. Perhaps she adopted male attire to obtain the privilege of the elective franchise. Altogether it is a strange case, and were not Charley Parkhurst so well known in this State, the story would be open to suspicion as a country paper sensation.

Stock Report: The total product of Colorado mines for the year 1879 is given at \$19,110,802. John J. Valentine, General Superintendent of Wells, Fargo & Co's Express, says in his annual report of bullion production that the reports of the bullion yield of Leadville mines are conflicting, varying as much as \$2,000,000. The total product of Nevada for the year in gold and silver was \$21,997,714. The value of lead produced in Colorado is counted, while for Nevada it is ignored. The value of the lead, added to that of gold and silver not passing through the hands of the Express Company, would largely increase the total value of the State's production. The year has been an off year for bullion production in Nevada, but, admitting the correctness of the figures for Colorado, which are doubtless exaggerated, and adding the value of the lead and non-expressed bullion, which will increase the amount at least 3,000,000, and Nevada in one of its poorest years exceeds Colorado by five or six millions. The product of Eureka district alone was nearly one-fourth of the entire product of the State of Colorado.

Local Legislation.

Bodie Standard.

Citizens of Mono county who have suggestions to make in regard to legislation affecting our local interests, should not be backward in forwarding the same to our Assemblyman, Joe Wasson. Mr. Wasson is familiar with many and perhaps all of the wants of our people; but he would no doubt be thankful if his constituents would submit their suggestions and ideas to him by way of refreshing his memory. We know he is anxious to do all he can for the people whom he represents, and he can do much, for he is a tireless worker; but in the hurry and bustle of a short session under a new constitution, necessitating the enactment of an entire new code of laws, and while looking after the interest of the whole people of the State, he might overlook some points of local interest which he would otherwise carry if his immediate constituency will only aid him in his work by their friendly advice and suggestions.
