They fulfilled their part of the contract, the middle man, it seems, slipped with the funds, and now both the Gas Company and deluded Supervisors are tearing their hair. Miss Siskies, daughter of Gen. D. S. Siskies, who eloped the other day in Paris, is the only child of the Theresa Dagglois, who figured in the episode of twenty years ago. It was her mother who was lost astray by Philip Barton Key, and the daughter figured in the sentimental accounts of that day as "a sweet infant one year old." Some of the papers fall into the error of supposing that the present Mrs. Siskies is the crying wife with whom the General became reconciled. Theresa Dagglois died two years after the reconciliation. Gen. Siskies married again and has two daughters by that marriage. The position of the first child in the family must have been a cruel one.

CREAM OF THE TELEGRAPH.

The Argentine Republic has ordered two tontrucks to be purchased in Europe. There are conflicting reports about the elopement of General Dan Siskies's daughter. A Tammany and Republican combination is said to be maturing a plan for the removal of Mayor Cooper, of New York. There is little doubt that there is an intention to count out the Republicans in Maine. What a rebuff for Louisiana and Florida! The Republican State Committee of California, have requested that George C. Gofman's place on the National Republican Committee be vacated. Albert H. Bly, a member of the U. S. House of Representatives, has been elected to the Senate. Bly came to California in 1849, and was among the best known of the Pacific coast pioneers. Eliza Halston, of the Revenue Board fame, was arrested at Canton, Mississippi, on Saturday, charged with murdering her husband, to whom she had been married two years. The former Confederate cutter the Shenandoah, has been sunk off the island of Socatra, in the Indian ocean. The date of the disaster is unknown. Most of the crew were drowned. The Shenandoah belonged to the Sultan of Zanzibar. The survivors of Admiral Farragut's fleet have formed an association, the object of which is to secure a settlement of the prize money due the fleet for captures made at New Orleans in April, 1862, and decreed them by the United States Supreme Court. Hon. F. C. Beaman, recently appointed United States Senator to fill the unexpired term of the late Senator Chandler, has declined on account of ill health, and Governor Crocker has appointed ex-Governor Henry P. Baldwin, of Detroit, to fill the vacancy. The Western Union, which with the Gold and Stock Telegraph and other associated companies has done the principal telephone business throughout the country, has contracted with its principal rival, the National Bell Telephone Company, an arrangement by which the latter takes the business, the former practically retiring.

MINING NOTES.

Eureka Ore. declares a dividend of \$1. Redie declares a dividend of fifty cents. Richmond shares, according to last advices from London, were quoted at \$47 3/4 and \$48 1/4. The header of the north lateral drift of the Sastro tunnel is now in Gould's Curry ground. The joint west Ophir and Mexican crosscut on the 2300 level has passed through bird-eye porphyry into the same promising formation as that found in the north drift run into the Mexican on the same level. The bottom of the Ophir incline is said to be passing into a very promising formation. The joint west crosscut on the 2300 level of the Mexican line is also in a formation containing streaks of ore giving good assays. It is now found, through careful measurement, that the Union Consolidated ground is ten feet short of what was supposed to have been patented; that is, where they supposed they had 600 feet they really have but 590. Several mining companies are placing large blocks of stock in London. The Little Pittsburgh, of Leadville, is said to have sold a considerable amount there, and it is rumored that the Horn Silver mine, of Utah will shortly do the same. Manhattan District, fifteen miles south of Belmont, is likely to boom up again very soon. Several Belmont gentlemen who own claims in that district intend to resume work thereon shortly. The ore is free milling and there is an abundance of it. Henry J. Donnelly, Superintendent of the Eureka Ore., is in San Francisco ordering machinery and making other arrangements for the sinking of the big working shaft on the ground of the Eureka Ore. The sinking of this shaft will be the most important work ever inaugurated in Eureka District. Some of the richest ore ever taken out of the Comstock has been and is being taken out of the Hardy vein in the Ophir mine. In the Hardy vein have been found many beautiful specimens of genuine silver sulphide, richer than the Stephanite, and which has been found nowhere on the lode except on the Ophir in the early days. It is thought that the new Yellow Jacket hoisting machinery, says the Enterprise of November 13th, will be ready to start up next Saturday. They are about ready to knock a hole through between the north drift on the 2700 level and the east drift from the bottom of the north incline. This will give a fine circulation of air, and permit of crosscutting at that point. The Silver Lake, Mineral King and Pinnacle Mill and Mining Companies have incorporated. The capital stock of each is \$10,000,000, and the Directors are M. W. Fox, A. D. Carvill, Donald McLean, George P. Thurston and Peter Murray. The Silver Lake proposes to operate in Tulare, Inyo and Fresno counties, and the others in Mineral King District, Tulare county.

DODIE ITEMS.

Pneumonia is on the wane. Only one death in two days. Dr. Deal has been called over to Mono Lake to attend a man sick with pneumonia. Wood supplies for the winter have been laid in at nearly all the hoisting works on the hill. The weather has been most favorable and it has been fully taken advantage of. The wife of H. Z. Osborne, of the Free Press, is lying dangerously ill. She has, however, passed the dangerous point, and a change for the better is anticipated and hoped for. The examination of Rosa, the Spanish maid who cut John P. Green across the face a few days ago, is in progress before Judge Peterson's court this afternoon. From indications it would seem that Green will be arrested and Rosa liberated. At the Bulwer Standard mill all is life and activity. Teams are constantly arriving and unloading lumber, machinery, timbers, brick and stone, and a perfect swarm of mechanics and laborers are employed on the work. The battery frames are already up, and the foundations for the engine bed are nearly laid. A heavy force of men are engaged in erecting the pan and settler frames. The boilers have arrived, and are being placed in position. As soon as they are, masons will begin bricking them up. The building is already completed, and most of the machinery is on the ground. The pans, settlers, battery stems, band wheels, boiler, engine stack, and a large quantity of shoes and dies and piping are here. Orange Blossoms. On Wednesday evening, November 13, Mr. A. W. Rose, Jr., the Secretary of the Mammoth Mining Company, and Miss Emma, daughter of Alvinza Hayward, the San Francisco capitalist, were united in marriage. Miss Hayward is her father's only child, and will of course inherit vast wealth. We congratulate Mr. Rose upon having struck it rich.

A Terrible Explosion.

The railroad tunnel of the Bay Coast Narrow Gauge Railroad Company, near Wright's station, Santa Cruz county, was on Tuesday the scene of a terrible explosion, in which thirty Chinamen were killed and a large number wounded. The explosion was caused by coal gas, which is abundant in the soft cleaginous rock through which the tunnel is being run. Several accidents have occurred before this, but none so serious.

Wild bear hunts are the rage now near Santa Rosa. Thus far the boys have won the dogs and used up the hunters in long chase.

The Solano Republican says that snipe are plentiful down in the tule, but ducks are still scarce. Geese are already getting too numerous to be agreeable.

Ducks have not yet arrived on the bay in sufficient numbers to make good shooting at Alviso, Alvarado, the Milbrage and others of the old favorite resorts.

W. B. Stewart caught a silver gray fox at the Brentwood coal mines, Contra Costa county, one day last week. This is the first of that species of animals seen in this section for several years.

Russian River Frog: The two lion kittens caught by Wils. Snaggers, a year ago, are so cross that he has concluded to kill them. There is a chance for some one to get some pets cheap, if applied for soon.

Frank Louf, the boy hunter of Tulare, 15 years of age, killed seven deer in one day in Deer canyon, north of the Mineral King. He makes a business of hunting, and has killed this season thirty-nine deer and bear.

The Santa Rosa sportsmen are making extensive preparations for their great three days shooting match on Thanksgiving and succeeding days. They have already on hand fifty dozen pigeon, and more than 100 dozen charged.

The grand pigeon-shooting match for \$2,000 in prizes, which has been in contemplation under the joint auspices of the several trap-shooting clubs of this city, has been postponed until February. It will probably take place on Washington's Birthday.

D. J. Staples, President of the Fireman's Fund Insurance Company, and a prominent sportsman of this city, while shooting shore birds near Redwood one day, about two weeks ago, killed thirty-two robin snipe by firing both barrels of his gun at a passing flock.

The Napa Sportsman's Club had a trap-shooting match last Friday, using quail instead of pigeons. They were found to answer the purpose well. T. A. Pierson won the club medal with the only clean score of the day. Alex. Gridley, J. Gridley and William West, each killed all but one of their birds.

The report of a gun is about the first thing we hear upon arising from our night's rest. Hunters from the city and our town have had very good shooting during the past week. Duck, geese, quail, etc., are very abundant at present, and all who go for a day's sport return heavily laden with game.
