THE CEMENT HUNTERS.

A FANCIFUL TALE OF MONO COUNTY.

A Remarkable Search for Remarkable Material-Ocment and Gold About Evenly Mixed.

In the summer of 1,57 a party of emigrants, on their way to the gold nelds of California, by the southern route, reached Death valley, that dismal sink of Amargosa river, whose lowest points are nearly 500 feet below sea level, and which was briefly de-scribed in the first chapter. In brav-ing its then unknown terrors and atcapting to cross, they met with dis-aster such as too often overtook those who ascended into this hot, parched, alkali covered chasm. Nor can we wonder at its fatality and the painful safferings of those pioneers who succeeded in crossing it, when we remember that a well equipped party of I nited States surveyors, who entered it in 1874, were glad to get out after 48 hours of most trying experience, by which they learned that the temperature of its close atmosphere did not in such seasons full below 117 degrees Pahrenheit at midnight, while its day time beat and glare were so intense as almost to craze men and horses.

In its depths two men of this emigrant party lost their teams, and had to leave their wagons and outlits,
They kept with the train, however, They kept with the train, however, till they were nearing the eastern slope of the Sierra Nevada. When they reached a point in what is now Owen's vattey, they were told by their contrades that it was only about sixty miles directly across these mountains to where gold digging was going on, but that the wardas must take a much. but that the wagons must take a much longer route toward the north to find with their packs for the Nevadas. They came to the head of a stream, They came to the head of a stream, supposed to be Owen's river, and in traveling through "the burnt country" they sat down to rest. A TIMELY PROTEST. The Carson Appeal has been preach-

ing an admirable sermon on a topic that the TIMEs itself has had, and is going to have more to say, to wit: the unblushing mining frauds that have been attempted on the Eastern public, by a lot of broken down adventurers trom the Pacific Coast. One can pick against one publisher taking what up the New York Mining Record, the office of which is the headquarters of these frauds, and see the names of a dozen people figuring as Presidents and Directors of wild cats, "mining agents" and the like, not one of which could on Pine street, San Francisco, borrow fifty cents to buy a din-ner. Speaking of these knaves and the injury they are likely to work to our mining interests, the Appeal says:
For the past year Gofham has been overrun
